As I sit here typing my ramblings in the sunshine of an October heatwave wearing my mankini.

By the time you receive this newsletter, we will have had our AGM.



As the Annual General Meeting coincides with my ramblings I will focus on our recent trip to the Corby show in this issue.

We were recently asked to exhibit at the Corby show, after they kindly exhibited their layout at our show earlier this year. See page 13 of this newsletter.

We decided that the Kingsthorpe 0 gauge layout would be the layout we would take, but had to think seriously about the cost to hire a van to do a local two day show. However, they very kindly offered to take and return it to us using their large trailer at NO cost. They arrived on the Thursday evening before the show and collected it, and then they returned it the following Thursday. as promised, and I cannot thank them enough for their help and assistance.

The layout went up on the Saturday morning really quickly, considering its size, due to the really useful metal A frame support legs and the electrical block connectors with pins and sockets that connect automatically as the boards go together.

We were surrounded in the hall with quite a few traders and layouts that we already knew well and were friendly with, plus some new ones which was good. The Corby members again could not have been more friendly and helpful, and made the exhibition a joy to do. We were offered as much tea or coffee as we wanted, and a hot meal at lunchtime on the Saturday and a mixed salad on the Sunday.

The layout behaved well with only a few very minor problems. Considering it had only recently been overhauled and updated with the latest DCC concepts point motors and a Traindriver phone app I think it ran well and it also went down well with the public. Some sunshine shining through the windows in the hall really lit up certain areas of the layout and made it look quite realistic. Sound on many of the locos added to the realism, and smoke generators on a couple of my steam locos seemed to help with this aid to realism.

On the Sunday I must admit I was a little worried as only Stephen and I were in attendance until fifteen minutes before the show opened, when Alan and Henry arrived to assist in running the layout. I even got one of the Corby members to download the Traindriver app on to his phone just in case. This new technology allows you to drive the train and change the points from your mobile phone and is a wonderful addition that has made model railway a little more future proof for the younger model railway enthusiast.

I must thank all the members who helped in making the running of Kingsthorpe possible in time for this show, but who were unable to make it to the show for various reasons.

I was so very pleased overall with the performance of the Kingsthorpe layout at the show, compared to the last time it went out at the Cogenhoe show a few years ago, when we had a lot of problems on the day.

Kingsthorpe, is actually, two layouts in one, with the modern image part at the back and a separate preserved layout at the front, only joined with an interchange set of points to take stock, from one to another when required.

Since the show I have had a bit of a Eurika moment and have begun to work on the baseboards of a new 00 gauge version of Kingsthorpe that hopefully we can take to shows in the future. I thought Baronsthorpe may be a good name for it.

The Great Train Robbery

On the 8th August 1963 a daring heist on Britain's railway took place. This was The Great Train Robbery and this year marks the 60th anniversary of this event.

I'm not going into any great detail on this event as there is plenty of material already within the public domain and on the net telling the full story of events.

For us as railway modellers/enthusiasts it's the railway side of things that is probably the most interesting part, so its these parts I will concentrate on.

The train to be robbed

At 18:50 on Wednesday 7 August 1963, the travelling post office (TPO) "Up Special" train set off from Glasgow Central station en route to London Euston. It was scheduled to arrive at Euston at 04:00 the following morning.

The locomotive involved

The train was hauled by an English Electric Type 4 (later Class 40) dieselelectric locomotive D326 (later 40 126). The loco was scrapped in April 1984. It was prevented from being preserved by ASLEF in respect for the injuries received by the driver, Jack Mills, at the hands of the robbers.

Train make up

The train consisted of 12 carriages and carried 72 Post Office staff who sorted mail during the journey. The second carriage behind the engine was known as the HVP (high-value packages) coach, which carried large amounts of money and registered mail for sorting. Usually, the value of the shipment was in the region of £300,000, but because the previous weekend had been a UK Bank Holiday weekend, the total on the day of the robbery was to be between £2.5 and £3 million. That's equivalent to about £45 million at todays value. That puts it as one of the biggest robberies ever carried out on mainland Britain.


On Saturday 12th August our club held its annual exhibition at Roade Village Hall. On the following pages are some pictures of some of the layouts that were on display.




The N Gauge Show

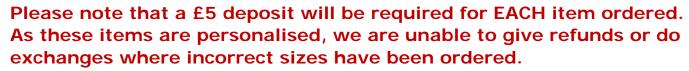
