# Chesterfield Group Model Exhibition Day Trip By Bus by Roger Whiffin



On Saturday 10th June this year I decided to visit the Peak Model Rail Exhibition.

I decided to go by bus. More like a 25 hrs Le Mans rather than a marathon Make full use your bus passes everyone - ding, ding.

My first bus of the day 06:40 Kingsthorpe shops - X7 - Leicester (Haymarket) 2nd - 0810 Leicester (St Margarets) - Skylink - Derby 3rd - 0950 Derby - Bakewell - TransPeak

It was a really nice exhibition, saw several old friends and got some info that I wanted. Hope to see them again at Loughborough. All layouts were ones that I had not seen before so a big plus for going that far out.

I did not knowingly see any Bakewell tarts, but there was a shop advertising them. [Ed—Had you have seen a Bakewell Tart, would you have

remembered her name?).

Going home - same route but in reverse. I just missed the TransPeak to Derby that I wanted so had to waste an hour as a tourist.

I eventually got off at Kingsthorpe 19:30 or so, with a rather tiring walk back home from the Kingsthorpe shops.

The exhibition was situated in the heart of the Peak District of Derbyshire at Bakewell. This is a busy town with a variety of shops and cafes. The Peak Exhibition is held at the Agricultural Business Centre which is a modern purpose built venue, a short distance from the town centre.

To Bakewell and beyond?

Phase 1: Realistic plans are afoot for the extension of the present running line north to the site of the second Rowsley station in the village. A 99-year lease is about to be signed with the council on the currently disused trackbed to the A6 road. Rowsley station will have to be rebuilt.

Phase 2: From Rowsley, matters start to get difficult because the biggest obstacle immediately north is the missing A6 road bridge. If the Great Central can do it, so can Peak Rail. Rowsley viaduct over the River Derwent will need restoring, along with the trackbed. A halt could be built at Haddon, benefiting the hall and railway combined (provided the duke does not object!)

Phase 3: Restoring Haddon Tunnel and Coombes Road viaduct to their former uses, then relaying track into the station site and restoring that to its former use. As with any extension, it depends on the necessary finance being raised – but how about a share issue to get this railway into Bakewell, tantalisingly close to Monsal Dale? However, the ambition to complete the reopening of the railway through the Peak District National Park to Buxton remains alive.

Not to be held back, Peak Rail is currently in discussions with various commercial interests, together with the relevant national and local authorities, about the possibilities of reopening the Matlock-Buxton line as a freight diversionary route.

## John Baxter 1934 — 2023 A Tribute

On 10th May this year we lost a long serving stalwart member of this club—John Baxter.

John was probably our oldest member, who celebrated his 89th birthday on 8th February this year.

John was a very active member right until the end. He enthusiastically supported lots of our events by helping out. He was also very keen in helping with the club layouts when work needed doing. It would be nice if a few more members followed his example.

His funeral was held on Thursday 22nd June 2023 at The Counties Crematorium. The Club was represented by Michael Castledine, Richard Deacon, Les Pace and myself.



The Eulogy as given at his funeral by his nephew Stephen Davis;

John was the first of two sons for Thomas and Connie Baxter. He was born on 8<sup>th</sup> February 1934 in Kettering.

He grew up in and around the Kettering and Rothwell area. He attended Wharflands School, Oakham and Kettering Grammer School. John paid the £1 fee to remain a life time member of the Cytringanians the Kettering Grammer School Old Boys group with whom he remained an active member of the alumni his whole life.

As a boy he joined the 10<sup>th</sup> Kettering Scouts in Fox Patrol and accumulated his badges. He was very passionate about the Scout movement as his father Thomas had progressed to District Commissioner in the Northamptonshire Scout Movement and having met Baden Powell at a 1929 Jamboree.

Through the Grammer School John also took part in amateur dramatics with the Hygram Players. He starred in Twelfth Night as Curio Valentine and The Merry Wives of Windsor as John Robert. He worked backstage on A Hundred Years Old and The Way of the World. In 1953 John completed his National Service in Gloucestershire in the RAF. In the summers of 1955 and 1956 John went on long road trips to Scandinavia and southern Europe with friends in a VW Beetle. They stopped at the major cities along the route sight seeing and enjoying local hospitality and by his own notes buying a chocolate bar in every European city he visited.

After leaving school John joined Norwich Union insurance before eventually working for SATRA – The Shoe and Allied Trades Research Association in 1970. John performed various management roles within SATRA. He was very proud of the work SATRA did and the research they conducted. John remained loyal to SATRA until he retired in 1993.

During this period, in South Northamptonshire Young Conservative group, John met Elizabeth Watson. They eventually married on 5<sup>th</sup> September 1964 in Kislingbury Church.

John was devoted to Elizabeth. Together they travelled the world. This was facilitated through the Rose Society of which they were both active members. Through this group they made many friends, not least Ken and Rani who would join them on their adventures abroad. Through the Rose Society they were able to travel to South and North America, Australia, Europe and all across the UK. Both would be involved in judging at these shows across the world. They would also show their own roses. Often they would go to Hampton Court and Chelsea Flower Shows. They were also members of the Amateur Rose Association Committee, John acting as secretary and treasurer through the years.

John carried on this love affair with roses and went on to write and have published an encyclopaedia of Antique Roses, dedicating the book to his beloved Elizabeth. This was a record of all known rose varieties before 1900 cataloguing, type, year, raiser, colour, bloom, growth and scent. It is an impressive piece of work. John was also a Member of the World Federation of Rose Societies. He judged at Los Angeles, Paris, Belfast, Glasgow.

John and Elizabeth also shared a great love of classical music and would often listen to the Northampton Philharmonic Orchestra and attend concerts at Derngate. One infamous night they tried to educate me with Mahler. Suffice to say the symbols kept waking me up! John joined the friends of Northampton Philharmonic Orchestra and carried on attending concerts with friends.

John and Elizabeth also played golf together, members at the St Andrew's Hospital golf course. They both hooked me on to golf organising my first and only lessons at Delapre on a Saturday morning and buying my first Sam Snead junior set of clubs. John and I played a couple of times together at St Andrews. They also played regularly with Ken.

After retiring from SATRA John worked part time at Insurance world from 1995 and met and befriended Sharon and Tony. As it was closely linked to Cars, John loved working at Insurance World in a family business supporting and protecting the local community. He worked in accounts and helped with claims.



Now, you who deeply feel its loss, Be comforted, the rose blooms there, Its beauty even greater now, Nurtured by God's own loving care.




