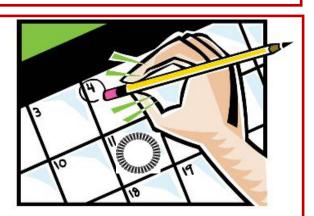

This was the nickname applied to the un-rebuilt Bullied light Pacific's. They were referred to as Spam Cans due to the fact that they were built during war time and their slab sided casing resembled the Spam Cans that so many people had as part of their food rations.

## David Shepherd CBE FRSA FGRA

I was quite surprised whilst reading a railway magazine in WH Smith a month ago to discover that the "Man Who Loved Giants" — David Shepherd had died. He passed away on September 19th after battling Parkinson's disease for 10 weeks prior to his death. I don't recall hearing anything about his passing on the national media news either on TV, radio or the press. David Shepherd was born in London in 1931.

As railway enthusiasts we are (or I hope we are) aware of his interest in railway preservation and in particular the two big locos he personally owned until recently, namely a BR Standard 9F no 92203 which he named Black Prince and the BR Standard class 4 no 75029 which he named The Green Knight. Both locos were Swindon built (thought I would just mention that). Without him the East Somerset Railway probably wouldn't be in existence.

As well as steam preservation, David Shepherd was a prolific campaigner for wild life preservation as well; in particular the fight against hunting elephants and the sickening trade in ivory.

### All Change on the Western Region

On 16th October 2017 the first of the new Hitachi Class 800 IEPs (Intercity Express Programme) trains went into revenue earning service. These trains will run between London Paddington and Swansea. Next year the service will be extended into Devon with Class 802s running to Exeter.

As the Great Western Mainline is not being electrified beyond Cardiff these IEPs are bi-



mode trains. This means they can run either on their diesel engines or by the overhead catenary. Their diesel engines are MTUs—and we know where they had their railway origins. A clue is on the front cover.

The IEPs are being built by Hitachi at a factory in the north of England. Needless to say these trains will be the death knell for the HSTs.

I'm interested in steam and electric traction both full size and model I'm involved in model railway and model engineering exhibitions both locally and further afield

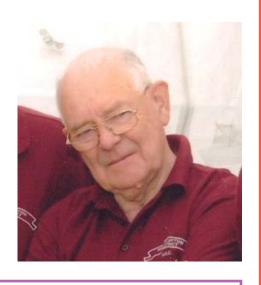
I belong to 2 U3A Groups one of which one is railway related I've spent my entire career in engineering; a career in which I never lost my bearings.

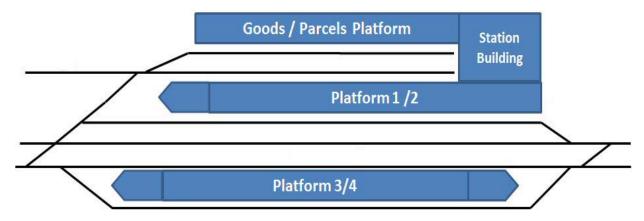

# FOUR OAKES JUNCTION

What is Four Oakes Junction you are asking yourself. This has been decided upon as the new name for the replacement Greenford layout.

In response to the Club's request for a new name for the new layout; the response was zilch—no surprises there then. The E has been put into Oakes as there is a Four Oaks near Birmingham. As you can see from the colour of the above totem, like Greenford, the station and its architecture will be Southern Region influenced. This is because we will have some third-rail electrified lines and also we want to reuse the buildings we bought for Greenford some of which are in the Southern Art-Deco style.



This is a PROPOSED track plan of the station. It is hoped not to use any double slips. If we were powering the track solely via DCC then its not an issue, but analogue wiring makes it more complex. Until we can actually physically lay the track out on the base boards we will not have a true idea of what is achievable. We have had a go with the Peco paper templates but we were not convinced what we can get in the space.

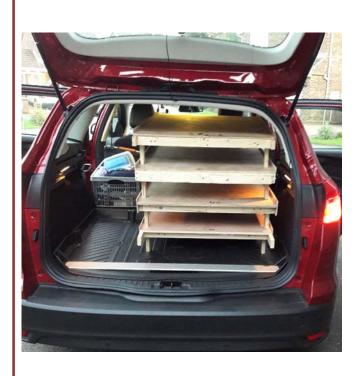
We are looking to have the main platforms capable of holding 8 coach trains. This layout needs to be built to exhibition standard in terms of both scenic embellishments and operationally. The building process will require the right people with the right skills performing tasks within their capabilities. This means no bodgers, no members of the Heath Robinson Fan club and no "That'll do" mentality.

#### Four Oakes Junction requirements:

Here are some of the starting requirements we would like from the new layout. There will be other requirements so please have a think and let us know what else we require to make this layout successful. I know I'm probably expecting too much for members to respond to anything in the newsletter, but one day a miracle might happen.

- All the baseboards need to be stackable. This is for storage and transportability.
- As the baseboards will be stackable the only infrastructure that will be permanently part of the baseboards will be the station platforms and any wired signals/ lamps that can be laid flat.
- All scenery and buildings etc will be removable.
- The connections to the fiddle yard wiring & plugs needs to be simplified.
- Reduce the amount of legs used to support the fiddle yard.
- The layout will need to be wired to accommodate both analogue and DCC.
- When out on exhibition the layout period is 1950-1965. Only appropriate liveries and insignia to be used on stock.

This is just the start. We need to learn from the mistakes that were made on Greenford, Kingsthorpe and the old test track.



By having the boards stackable we can hopefully go to exhibitions without having to keep hiring a van.





I'm sure all Club members will be pleased to learn that we have been invited back to the Great Central Railway Model Event for 2018 being held on June 15th to 17th inclusive. I expect, as this year, we will set up on the Thursday (June 14th).

We shall just be taking the main Test Track as a Club. Les will be taking his O gauge East Bridge layout.

All the paperwork has been sent off, on which we are putting down 12 operators. Hopefully we will now get enough passes for everyone (entrance, car park and lunch voucher).

A track plan has been submitted for inclusion in the exhibition brochure along with a photo, an example of which is below. Trains posed for this photo at the Test Track night on 17th November. Unfortunately we could included any members in this photo as their poses weren't suitable—I'll leave it at that.



### **European Union's General Data Protection Regulation**

All members records have now been transferred to a N&DMRC customised database in MS Access. This has enabled much more automation of administerive tasks through the use of Visual Basic coding. This basically means any data relating to members that is added, amended or deleted is traceable, i.e. what was changed, when and who by. The audit trail programming is now complete.
